#### **Money Matters**

#### Accounts 2019/20

The last Newsletter forecast the result for the year as being a surplus of just over £2,000.

The accounts are now finalised and have been passed by the Examiner and, after adjusting for advance payments and receipts, show a surplus of £2,165. This will be available towards the cost of our next concert. When this will be is not known due to Covid-19, which has already resulted in the loss of two concerts and the future is still very uncertain. The December Nativity has been lost and the rescheduled Zimbe and Mass in Blue hoped to be in May 2021 has also been put on hold as

it seems unlikely that rehearsals will be able to start in January which would be essential. The logistics of arranging the school choirs and Amabile would also be extremely difficult. It is not forgotten and hopefully can

be rearranged some other time.

The grants which had been obtained towards Zimbe have now lapsed and new applications will have to be made. It is hoped some easier singing may be possible in May. You will get a copy of the accounts in due course as the Committee hopes to arrange the AGM in the new year by Zoom.

#### Easy Fundraising and Amazon Smile

The appeal last time for more use of this easy way of raising funds seems to have borne some fruit as we have since received just over £57 from EasyFundraising and some income from Amazon Smile. Keep up the good work.

Somehow singing along to a CD in the kitchen isn't the same as our Tuesday nights with Kendal South, and it will be wonderful to be back together again, singing with Geoff. At least that's looking a bit nearer now. See you soonish, and warmest wishes for a better New Year!

My family loved music. Dad was in the Bach Choir and played the piano – usually Bach. I got into choral singing when I was at school. You didn't have much choice as the Director of Music was fierce. She had been taught by Gustav Holst at St Paul's Girls' School in

London and was very good, and we sang a huge variety of music, so I actually owe her a lot. I was put into the Alto section because she needed a few more. That taught me about the interwoven texture of music, even if I wasn't a natural alto. (I was 'kicked upstairs' when I joined the St Paul's Festival Choir in London and was told by the conductor, Richard Latham, 'You're not an Alto – you're just a lazy Soprano!').

From university onwards I have always been a member of a choral society, in total 8 over the years, plus a small madrigal group, and sang in 3 church choirs, most memorably in St Michael and all Angels Presbyterian Church in Blantyre, Malawi, when I was a VSO. The Scottish Minister set some hymns to Ngoni tunes, often led by a cantor, and then everyone came in (rather faster) on about the third bar of every line, sometimes all of us together. The sound echoing around the huge old building was thrilling.

Choral Music has meant so much to me. There's the music itself, always new, and even if you've sung the 'St John Passion' 5 times there will still be new angles to explore. Then there is the fun and challenge of decoding this different 'language' and gradually making it your own, and working together with people who share your passion and who become friends. There is something unique about this activity. It doesn't matter where you are, this grounds you, gives you a feeling of belonging, in a place and also in a long tradition of beautiful sound, 'of infinite variety'.

I have missed it terribly over these months. Not being allowed to sing in church either (when it's been open) has been painful. I hum behind my mask.

Favourite pieces: Ubi Caritas, no 1 of his Quatre Motets, by Duruflé, or, as a complete contrast, 'The bold grenadier', first line "As I was a-walking".

I started singing aged eight. The local church choirmaster came to my school seeking boys to join the choir. I enjoyed the first practice so joined and have been singing ever since. I even managed to do some singing during my Naval service, when in Trinidad I joined the local church choir.

Back home again I re-joined the church choir. An office colleague conducted the West Borough Singers and invited me to join. He also ran a church choir and I went with them to Canterbury Cathedral which was full of RSCM choirs from all over Kent. It was a very fulfilling day.

With the Coventry Philharmonic Choir I sang my first major work — Verdi's Requiem. At church I was asked to run a small choir of children at a daughter church on a new estate. That was very interesting. The young man who played the harmonium also sang bass. I managed to get a few girls to sing alto so we were often able to sing in four parts.

In Romford I joined the Music and Arts choir. Heard singing in the church congregation I was invited to join the choir, then The Wykeham singers and then the Upminster Bach Choir. This proved too much so I gave up the Music and Arts choir and the church choir (furthest away). The Wykeham Singers was a small group (rehearsals were held in the conductor's front room) but still sang all sorts of pieces from madrigals to Brahms Requiem. With them I sang in several quartets and a trio.

Singing with them brought an invitation to sing tenor solo in Olivet to Calvary in the local church. We twice entered the BBC choir of the year competition, once coming in the top three so we were broadcast. It was a great experience recording our piece at Broadcasting House. I also enjoyed singing at holiday camp concerts both solo and duets.

Moving to Grasmere in 1984 I was told that Kendal South was the best choir to join, Jim Noble conducting. And the rest as they say is history.

A favourite piece is Jesu Joy of Man's Desiring, because it was sung by the whole school (450/500 boys) with the school orchestra. All boys were split into voice parts form by form and rehearsed. The introduction and parts between verses was played beautifully on the oboe by a form mate of mine.
